Course Description

An introduction to challenges and issues of Serials and Electronic Resources Librarianship. Coverage areas include budgeting, licensing, acquisitions and the management of resources as well as staff.

Course Objectives

Students will become familiar with the current issues affecting serials and electronic resources in an ever changing environment and gain an understanding of the roles of the librarians, staff and marketplace handling and shaping this complex world. Discussions will include:

- Access to serials and electronic resources
- Collection Development
- Management of staff and resources
- Scholarly publishing

Teaching Method

Instruction will be a combination of lectures, guest lectures, collaborative student presentations, and small and large group discussions. Attendance and constructive participation are required.

Students will engage in the following research methods: Information Retrieval and Content Analysis.
